<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Established in the year 1966, Kidderpore College remains steadfast in its commitment to provide learning opportunities for all. It is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and is included in the list of colleges under section 2(f) &12(B) of the UGC Act,1956 under the head of Non-Government Colleges. The students here hail from varied social and economic backgrounds and present a mosaic of different cultures, languages, and faiths. It is because of the dedication and discipline of its students that Kidderpore College is now recognized as a promising institution of education in this region. Kidderpore College is one of the few in Kolkata which boasts of five language departments – English, Bengali, Hindi, Urdu and Persian. It has a dedicated team of teachers and most of them have been awarded Doctoral degrees. The non teaching staff members are helpful and supportive. The authorities and the faculty members acknowledge that learning comes in various forms and can be transmitted through various ways. Thus, the students are encouraged to take part in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities and competitions both in the college and outside. The NCC and NSS cells of the college are very active, and many students enroll each year. Voluntary community service organised by the college makes our young learners responsible, compassionate human beings. The Eco Club of the college imparts valuable education regarding protection and nurturance of our environment through seminars, lectures and practical workshops. The Women's Forum organises seminars, lectures and workshops directed at creating awareness regarding gender discrimination

The college has an enviable collection of books in its library. Regular book purchases monitored by the departments enrich the collection of the library which has also embarked on a project of digitalization of catalogues. Books, magazines, journals and pamphlets are availed of by both teachers and students. The Department of English, Kidderpore College, publishes an annual academic journal. Career Counselling Cell of the college performs a vital role in steering our students towards the right direction. The College has signed multiple Memoranda of Understanding with various colleges and organisations for a collaborative approach towards imparting inclusive education. The Alumni of the college contribute to the betterment of the institution.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 1. The College has a diverse students' community, and there is exposure to, and exchange of various cultures. The pluralist culture is reflected in the celebrations of different religious and cultural programmes, including Saraswati Puja and Iftar party. The College is one of the few in Kolkata which offers five languages to the students.
- 2. Interested students enthusiastically participate in class and extra-curricular activities. Our students regularly participate and also bag prizes in various competitions like the Hindi Mela, Youth Parliament.
- 3. Despite space crunch, we have a Language lab, ICT rooms, Smart Rooms, Computer Lab, and a Gymnasium.
- 4. In the last few months new rooms, inclusive of a Reading Room, have been added and new toilets have been constructed for the students.
- 5. Various national-level seminars, funded by Ministry of Human Resourse and other bodies like Urdu Academy, have been organized by our College.
- 6. The college boasts of highly qualified faculty members, most of whom hold a doctoral degree.
- 7. The non-teaching staff members of the college are very cooperative and actively contribute to the smooth functioning of the institution.
- 8. Under the guidance of our teachers, the students of our college run *Sahapathi*, Kidderpore College Community Education that helps educating underprivileged children of the locality.
- 9. The NSS & NCC Cells of the college organize regular educational and training programmes and voluntary community services to instill the spirit of empathy and social responsibility in our students.

- 10. Kidderpore College is one of the centres of NSOU that offers Distance Education through diploma programmes.
- 11. Our Library is a treasure trove for teachers and teachers. Special collections, rare books find space alongside a huge collection of books pertaining to the syllabi of all the courses offered by the college.
- 12. The college is proud of the academic journal annually published by the Department of English. Teachers of the institute are deeply research-oriented and publish regularly in national and international journals and books.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. Centred in a busy bustling urban location, our main problem continues to be the lack of space. Illegal occupation of land around the existing building has left no scope for expansion.
- 2. Language has been a nagging problem for many years and continues to be a vexing one. Our students mainly come from Hindi/Urdu linguistic background and, hence, find it difficult to write their examination papers in English and Bengali.
- 3. Many of our students come from very humble socio-economic backgrounds and are often forced to take up jobs, not only to contribute to their family income, but also to ensure that they can continue with their studies. This often leads to irregular attendance.
- 4. While our college is near the bus stop, the building is surrounded by congested habitation. Hence our College has a very narrow entrance. Moreover, blaring loudspeakers, at times, make it impossible for the teachers to make themselves heard and take classes peacefully.
- 5. Lack of a proper playing ground limits extra-curricular activities for the students. The college has no option but to organize its Annual Sports in the University grounds.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. The College has signed various Memoranda of Understanding with different colleges and institutions. This has led to faculty exchange programmes, and seminars in collaboration with each other. Although class taking was strictly restricted to the syllabus as prescribed by the University of Calcutta, the students enjoyed and took part in the discussions enthusiastically.
- 2. Many of our students shine brilliantly in their chosen path and make themselves and the College proud.
- 3. The students attended many seminars in which they interacted with various career counselling agencies. This provided them with the idea about the professional world that they would have to step into after their graduation from Kidderpore College.
- 4. Add-on courses have been designed in multiple domains to make our students gain competence in computer, language, mass communication, personality development etc.
- 5. The college takes great care to uplift the social condition of the local underprivileged children through various educational and training programmes.

Institutional Challenge

1. Attendance in class continues to be a major problem. The reasons behind this are that some of the students work as they have to support themselves and their family, and sometimes it is societal pressure which often forces particularly the female students to discontinue their education. Many students also shift their focus to courses which might help them to quickly secure a job

- 2. The economic background of the students is a big hindrance and, sometimes, proves to be the only reason behind the dropout in our College. The entire payment of fees is made in two parts at the time of admission and at the time of examination and this makes it difficult for the students.
- 3. Language of written communication, especially Bengali and English continues to be a challenge for our students, most of whom are proficient in Hindi or Urdu.
- 4. Lack of enough Non-Teaching staff members hinders the smooth operation of the college.
- 5. Seats for the reserved category of students are often not filled up because of lack of authentic documentation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Kidderpore College offers undergraduate programs in B.A./B.Sc., B.Com streams affiliated with the University of Calcutta. Orientation program provides students with the academic calendar, syllabus, and examination pattern. Some departments use innovative methods like Film screenings and discussions (e.g., Journalism & Mass Communication & English), Power Point presentations and LCD projectors, Guest lectures by experts. Some departments, like English, incorporate presentations & debates into their assessments. The college embraces technology for enhanced learning, using PowerPoint presentations and projectors for visual aids. The library offers access to online resources and databases. Fourteen add-on courses introduced in areas like soft skills development, enhance communication, teamwork, and problem-solving abilities. "Certified Accounting Technician" course was offered by the Commerce department. The College goes beyond theoretical knowledge by offering practical classes to hone job-specific skills. Internship opportunities provide valuable real-world experience, increasing student employability. Adapting to the Pandemic, the College Shifted to online learning platforms like Skype and Google Meet, conducting several online orientation programs, classes, webinars, and conferences. Online Yoga Courses and "Digital Literacy" training was provided during the pandemic for students' well-being. Alongside remedial classes for academically weaker students, counseling sessions are conducted for final year students on job prospects. Case studies, lectures by professionals, and courses on ethics help students develop critical thinking and ethical decision-making skills. Dedicated courses, workshops, and inclusive language promote gender equality and awareness. Community service opportunities and mentorship programs cultivate social responsibility and a sense of community. Courses, field trips, research projects, and sustainable practices on campus raise awareness about environmental challenges and encourage responsible behavior. More than 600 students per year write reflective essays to showcase how the curriculum has impacted their understanding of these crucial issues. Assessment rubrics consider the application of ethical principles, gender sensitivity, and sustainable practices. The College actively seeks feedback to improve its curriculum and services. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a crucial role by creating online surveys tailored for students, alumni, and employers. These gather feedback on curriculum relevance, infrastructure, and teaching effectiveness. The data is analyzed to identify areas for improvement for a more enriching student experience.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Kidderpore College caters specifically to the needs of students from underprivileged backgrounds, with a majority coming from the college's immediate vicinity. Many of these students are first-generation learners.

We admit our students through a transparent online process adhering to the admission and reservation guidelines given by the University of Calcutta. Though we have students from all sections of society, the number of students from the SC/ST/OBC category with proper certificates are less in number.

The college has a sanctioned intake capacity of 1339 and the enrolment percentage of last 5 years is 53.84. The students' strength in 2022-23 was 2013 and the number of teachers was 58.

Learning is made more student-centric through a combination of old and new methods of teaching. In order to motivate the students beyond the scope of theoretical knowledge various teaching -learning methods are introduced, such as Orientation programmes, Study tours, Field trips, Seminars, GD, Projects, Competition, Cultural activities, Social awareness drives and many more. The college also has a well-equipped ICT system to make teaching and learning more effective.

We have a devoted group of teachers who are in possession of degrees like D.Litt., PhD, NET/SLET and many are in the process of completing their Doctoral research.

The Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes are clearly displayed in the institutional website and teachers make the students aware of these at the beginning of each Semester. The attainment of POs and Cos are tested. Our students are regularly assessed through Internal Examinations and Tutorials.

The University regularly conducts examinations and declaration of results is prompt. The average pass percentage during the last 5 years was above 50%. Most students clear all 6 semesters within the CBCS stipulated time frame of 5 years.

Students can register their grievances to the college authorities in relation to their internal assessments, marks allotment and end semester examinations. All the grievances are addressed and resolved with special care.

The college follows the NAAC guidelines and has submitted data for a student satisfaction survey to collect feedback from the students on curriculum delivery, management and institutional infrastructure facilities.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Kidderpore College has nurtured the environment for research and extension activities since the second cycle of NAAC accreditation. The NSS, NCC, and the cultural subcommittee have been active and vigilant throughout the period with their social outreach and extension programmes. As the physical location of the college is in a densely populated urban setting, that probably dates back to the birth of the city itself, regular awareness programmes on vector-borne diseases, clean campus drives and Ganga trekking, heritage walks form the plinth of the social outreach activities conducted by the college. The cosmopolitan demographic mix of students has prompted the NSS/NCC programme officers to inculcate among them the values of cleanliness, hygiene rules, regular health check-ups, drug addiction prevention, and community-building aspirations.

The ecosystem for innovation, the labyrinth of higher education, guided students through the rough Covid years, preparing them for online classes and online examinations. The online learning modules and the spread of ICT in education have been in full swing during these years. Workshops, seminars and hands-on training initiatives are some of the methods used by the institution.

The College has conducted interdisciplinary workshops, seminars with ICSSR-ERC funding, short-term courses/FDP focusing on Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and entrepreneurship. The Women's Forum, the Electoral Literacy Club, the HEPSN contributed their part in helping students to look beyond their immediate curriculum and enrich themselves through community welfare The Commerce Department of the college has been proactive in creating industry-college linkage.

The College has encouraged the faculties to publish in UGC Care listed journals, indexed academic journals and other publications like magazines, newsletters, etc. The younger faculty has contributed extensively to research and publications. An average of 15 teachers per year for the period under consideration contributed to chapters in edited volumes of books. The number ranges between 8 to 18 for contributions to Journals.

Publications like *Emerging Horizons in Commerce*, an ICSSR-ERC sponsored book (Levant Books) and *Maghribi Bengal Mein Urdu Tehqeeq-O-Tanqeed: Masail-O-Imkanat* in Collaboration with West Bengal Urdu Academy (Department of Urdu) and *Intersections*, a peer-reviewed annual online journal (Department of English) deserve special mention.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Adequate infrastructure facilities are necessary for efficient conduct of academic programmes. But finances become the key hurdles in growth of infrastructure in terms of keeping pace with the academic developments. The college provides suitable infrastructure facilities which are essential to maintain academic quality and also to meet the daily functional needs of the institution. Physical facilities for curricular and co-curricular activities include classrooms which are equipped with multimedia teaching aids. They are regularly used for presentations, seminars, screening movies, etc. The college provides facilities for extracurricular activities like sports, outdoor and indoor games, NSS, NCC, soft skills, Yoga and Cultural activities. The other facilities on the campus such as library, computer lab, Language lab, gymnasium, canteen, and students' common room are developed to contribute to the effective environment for curricular, extra- curricular and administrative activities.

The college has a well-equipped library which has a substantial collection of books, journals and other learning materials, e-resources through N-List (Inflibnet). The library is partially automated with Integrated Library

Management System-ILMS (e-Granthalaya, version 3.0 from the year 2014-15), Library Management software and OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue). The entire library premise is under CCTV surveillance as library provides open access to the students. The Librarian organizes Library Orientation Programmes at the beginning of the academic sessions to make students aware of all the services and facilities provided by the library.

The college is Wi-fi enabled campus. There is internet connectivity in the Principal's room, College Offices, Reading Room, Teachers' Staff Rooms, Library, Departments & the respective Laboratories. The speed is 80 MBPS. Adequate ICT facilities and other learning resources are adequately available in the institution for academic and administrative purposes.

The College Finance Committee allocates appropriate budget for maintenance of infrastructure as well as renovation and repair of the institutional structure. Annual maintenance facility for gymnasium, computers, air conditioners etc. are available.

Student Support and Progression

Kidderpore College makes sustained efforts to provide necessary support and assistance to the students, to enable them to acquire skills and experiences and to facilitate their holistic development and progression.

Minority Grants Sub Committee and Kanyashree Sub Committee enable the students of the minority community to get the minority grants to facilitate their studies and to fund education of the girl students.

There are statutory committees – Career counselling and Placement cell, Grievance Redressal cell, Anti-Ragging Cell, Women's Forum, Internal Complaints Committee and welfare measures to support students, including those for redressal of issues relating to Sexual Harassment and other matters of concern. Capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives are taken by the College which include giving our students training in Soft Skills. The College has signed MoU with Anudip Foundation that provides on-job training to the students. The Career counselling & Placement Cell has conducted a course on Digital Literacy in collaboration with Anudip Foundation, particularly for the girl students to enhance their digital skills. The Department of Journalism & Mass Communication has also conducted soft skill training in the form of Radio Production workshop. Communications and linguistic skills are provided by the Department of English. The Department of Physical Education along with the NCC Unit provide Life Skills like Yoga and physical fitness. Computing and ICT Skills have been imparted through workshops conducted by the Department of Education.

As ours is an Undergraduate College, the number of students getting jobs is relatively less compared to that of students proceeding to higher education. Our faculty are constantly working to make our students empowered participants in the job market.

Numerous Cultural events held at the college aim to increase the Cultural Competence of Students and make them aware of the plurality of our society. Our regular conduct of sports activities is important for developing a healthy mind in a healthy body. We encourage our students not only to participate in sports/cultural activities but also to bag prizes and make the institution proud.

The registered Alumni Association of the College consistently contributes to the development of the Institution by enriching the students with their practical experiences, philanthropic work towards the society and providing valuable guidance to the students as and when necessary.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Leadership, Governance and Management at Kidderpore College practices a democratic and participatory method of governance with all stakeholders participating actively in its administration in accordance with the vision and mission statement of the college. The Governing Body is the highest decision-making body for college administration who delegates authority to the Principal. It is comprised of teaching and non-teaching members, university and government nominees and student representative. The college focusses on imparting quality education by taking the views of all stakeholders associated with the college with regard to its mission.

Our college is a grant-in-aid affiliated college. The Principal being the secretary of the Governing Body takes initiative for proper implementation of plans. The college has initiated e-governance in the areas of administration, finance & accounts, students' admission and support, and examination for smooth functioning.

The teaching and non-teaching staff members enjoy several welfare supports like health insurance, different nature of leave and financial benefits. The teaching staff also get financial support for attending workshops.

Teaching-learning process is regularly monitored by the IQAC. The introduction of new course structure under NEP (2020) in the session 2023-24 along with existing CBCS courses has been smoothly implemented in all the departments of the college. All the faculty members are encouraged and supported to participate in Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, FDPs, Workshops, Seminars and Conferences related to the teaching-learning process and research. Collaborative quality initiatives with other institutions have been taken by the IQAC by signing Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for exchanging knowledge with them.

The audit of annual accounts of the college is attempted regularly by the external auditor recommended by the Higher Education Directorate, Government of West Bengal and such reports are tabled in the Governing Body for approval and ratification. The audit report is mandatorily sent to the office of the Director of Public Instructions, Government of West Bengal, immediately after the execution of the audit.

The IQAC initiated a number of initiatives like ISO certification, application for NIRF, execution of Academic and Administrative Audit, taking membership for online access of books from N-List under INFLIBNET, etc.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Kidderpore College tries its best to maintain gender equality in its campus. NSS & NCC encourages equal participation from male and female students alike. Facilities like separate toilets, common rooms, sanitary napkin vending machines are available here. Gender Sensitisation Programmes are organised to create awareness in the students regarding equal opportunities for all. Women's Forum organizes annual workshops and training programmes to facilitate this. Internal Complaints Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell and Women's Cell ensure gender equality is maintained.

The college is conscious of the importance of conservation of energy and waste management. There are separate waste-bins for non-biodegradable and biodegradable waste. As an institution we are aware of the need to conserve water and electricity. Tree plantation drives involving the students are regularly initiated by the Eco Club of the college. Disabled-friendly washroom has been built to make the infrastructure of the college more inclusive.

Quality audits on environment and energy are conducted by the institution. Initiatives are undertaken by the

students and teachers of the college to keep the campus clean and green. Low maintenance herbs and shrubs have been planted in recycled plastic bottles. College also organised awareness campaign for Mangrove Protection.

Kidderpore College receives students from different communities and religious faiths. To inculcate values of tolerance and harmony towards cultural, regional and linguistic differences, we celebrate Republic Day, Saraswati Puja, International Mother Language Day, Independence Day, Iftar party, etc.

As best practices, the Department of English publishes its annual journal, named Intersections – A Journal of Literary and Cultural Studies. Its primary objective is to publish high quality research papers by faculties, research scholars and students. Community Coaching classes, named Sohopathi are also held on a weekly basis, that assist local underprivileged children with their regular school work, co-curricular activities, stationery and copies.

The college was established with the aim to provide quality education to the local community for the long-term upliftment of the area. The people of the area are economically weaker and mostly first generation learners. The distinctiveness of our college lies in the fact that it offers courses in 5 languages – English, Bengali, Hindi, Urdu and Persian.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Kidderpore College aims at an integration of the Humanities and Arts with Science, Technology, and Mathematics. This will enhance positive learning outcomes, including increased creativity and

	innovation, critical thinking and problem-solving abilities, teamwork, communication skills, more in- depth learning with social and moral awareness. The Institution is trying to acquire the land adjacent to it for extension of the building and the introduction of the Science Block. So far as creativity and innovation are concerned, every Department endeavours to cultivate creativity among the students by encouraging them in project works. Kidderpore College has initiated various empowering steps towards the effective implementation of a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary mode of education keeping in view the NEP-2020 vision. The college authorities aim to devise strategies to overcome infrastructural challenges in this regard. Faculty members attend different workshops on NEP -2020 in the affiliated university as well as other colleges. Also, different workshops and seminars are organized by the institution for both the teaching and nonteaching members of the institutions to streamline the preparedness for NEP.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Academic Bank of Credit is envisaged as a digital bank that holds the credit earned by a student in any course. It is a major instrument for facilitating multidisciplinary and holistic education and multiple entry and exit in higher education. Since the institution is affiliated to the University of Calcutta, under the administrative control of Government of West Bengal, it will follow the guidelines whenever provided by the parent University to implement Academic Bank of Credits.
3. Skill development:	The Institute offers soft skills to the students in the form of certificate course in Digital Literacy through the Placement Cell of this College and in the other form by the Department of Journalism and Mass communication. Several options for vocational education and training are provided to the students through the Career Counselling Cell of this College. In every session the Career Counselling Cell invites several agencies and companies which offer vocational courses to the students, often free of cost, to make them employable after the completion of their Graduation course. Recently the Placement Cell of Kidderpore College has signed an MOU with Anudip Foundation to offer vocational training to the students at affordable cost at the end of their graduation. In addition to that the college offers free

	Add-on courses. The College has signed MOU with other agencies for providing hands-on training. Also the CBCS curriculum provides for SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSES for every subject taught at the College both in the Honours and General Levels.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Kidderpore College is one of the most unique colleges of West Bengal where five different types of Indian languages are taught, namely, Hindi, Bengali, English, Urdu and Persian. The students are offered Honours courses in Bengali, Hindi, English and Urdu and General degree course in Persian. The students taking up these languages in their three years of Graduation Course are inspired to participate in different cultural programmes involving drama, poetry writing, essay writing and extempore. Every year International Mother Language Day is celebrated to honour the Hindi, Bengali and Urdu Languages. Celebration of Independence Day, Birthday of Rabindranath Tagore are organized with active participation of students of all the languages. Hindi Diwas is celebrated every year to encourage the students to compose and recite poems in Hindi, perform Hindi Drama and cultivate the Hindi linguistic skills rigorously. Similarly the Bengali speaking students organise cultural programmes under the direct supervision and inspiration of their teachers. Some Add-on courses are offered by the departments of Bengali, Hindi, Urdu and Persian that focus on Indian language and culture. As most of our students are from Hindi and Urdu Medium Schools, most of the lectures are delivered in the Hindi with English as a supporting Language.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Our college follows the syllabus and course goals of the parent university. However, we try and formulate outcomes based on guidelines of the University. Program outcomes and course outcomes for all programs offered by the institution are communicated and explained to students. All the Departments of the Institution work hard to transform the concerned curriculum towards Outcome Based Education. Students of different departments have to submit project works. The teachers of different departments take their students out for educational tours to such places which are relevant to their curriculum. The Department of Political Science trains its students to perform Youth Parliament through which the

	students come to learn about the business and the proceedings within the Indian Parliament. The Department of Geography takes out its students for heritage tour in the neighbouring places. The Institution provides adequate financial and logistic support to enable the departments to transform their curriculum towards Outcome Based Education
6. Distance education/online education:	The recent pandemic changed the life style and patterns of all. Our College realized the need to change its system of imparting education during this period, shifting its focus to the online mode of education. Not only teaching-learning, but all co- curricular activities were conducted online during the lock down period. At present the Institution has a distance education study centre under Netaji Subhas Open University. The NSOU, the only State Open University in West Bengal, contributes to the quality human resource base of the State. The study centre has affiliation for both UG and PG courses. Regular classes are held in UG courses on Saturdays and Sundays from 2.30pm to 5.30 pm. The subjects taught in UG are History, Bengali,Environmental Science, food processing and English. In PG courses, the subjects taught are English, Bengali, Education, Mathematics, M.Com, MSW, Public Administration.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Kidderpore College follows the UG syllabus given by the University of Calcutta but strives to make it engaging and relevant. The Prospectus and Academic Calendar is published on the website so that the students get advance knowledge of the curriculum thought in the College. At the commencement of each academic session, an orientation programme is conducted for the newly inducted students to guarantee effective curriculum execution. In the orientation programme students are informed about overall structure of the programs, examination pattern and infrastructures provided. The CBCS system was introduced for B.Com Honours and General Courses in 2017-18 and for B.A. and B.Sc. Honours and General Courses in 2018-19 respectively. Before the beginning of an academic session all departments conduct departmental meeting where lesson plan, syllabus distribution, teaching methods, internal assessment methods are all decided. For academically weaker students each department arranges remedial classes and from 2021-22 session the Departments of Hindi, Political Science, Journalism, and Mass Communication introduced the Mentor-Mentee system for effective curriculum implementation and execution. From 2022-23 session Mentor-Mentee system was introduced in all Honours department. The use of the library efficiently supplements class lecture. Few departments use Power Point presentations and LCD projectors along with laptop and computers for effective classroom teaching. Extension lectures by notable persons in relevant fields also help students understand the difficult topics. All departments conduct continuous evaluation process for overall assessment of the students in form of internal and tutorial examinations. Besides, several departments take regular assessments through class tests, mock test using Google Form. While lectures often follow the traditional "chalk and talk" approach, some departments like Journalism & Mass Communication and English, Hindi take a more interactive route. They use film screenings and discussions to spark critical thinking and encourage students to look beyond the textbook. A small assessment in form of viva-voice is also conducted to assess the students understanding of the subject. The Department of Geography, Mass Communication, and Commerce has well equipped laboratory to facilitate practical classes. All departments to make the curriculum more interesting and engaging conduct the educational tours. The project work of students is guided for the accomplishment of analytical skills. Innovative methods include add-on courses, internship and practical classes that help students delve deeper into their chosen fields and prepare them for the competitive job market. During the 2021-22 academic year, the pandemic forced a shift to online learning. Classes are conducted online using platforms like Google Meet. Teachers and students actively interacted through webinars, conferences, and virtual classes. The college does not just focus on academics; they prioritize student well-being too. During the pandemic, they offered online yoga courses and collaborated with organizations to provide students with valuable "Digital Literacy" training. Students are also encouraged to participate in seminars, webinars, and special talks by national and international eminent academicians so as to broaden their understanding on different topics. Wall magazine, lab journal, etc. prepared by students under the guidance of departmental teachers reflect their awareness on world outside their syllabus and make them a more responsible and conscious citizens.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- Kidderpore College follows the guidelines and patterns provided by the University of Calcutta.
- Since 2018-19, as per the new CBCS System, the College started taking Internal examination, Tutorials and Practical examination for both hons and general papers within the college premises.
- In the new CBCS system, Total 100 marks is distributed as 20 (internal + attendance) 20 (tutorial) + 65 (theory). In case of practical based subjects, Practical paper of 30 marks is there. The mode of exam differs for each subject as per the instructions given by UGBoS of each subject.
- The Internal assessment is arranged and conducted by the central exam sub-committee in a transparent, student friendly, well-structured way. The Tutorial and practical examinations are conducted separately by each concerned department.
- The dates, room allotment and seat arrangements of internal assessments are done by the specific exam committees. Each department calculate attendance records of their students, evaluate the internal exam papers and upload the total internal marks as well as tutorial marks in university portal. The exam copies and results of all internal assessments are well preserved by the concerned departments.
- Apart from this, each department continuously evaluate their students through regular class tests, presentations using Power Points, Group Discussions, Wall Magazines and Projects.
- In each academic year, the Academic committee prepared a tentative academic calendar and each department prepares lesson plan.
- For comparatively weaker students, special remedial classes are usually arranged after each internal assessment.
- After each semester internal assessment, Parent Teachers meetings are conducted by each department to discuss about the academic status of their wards.
- During Covid-19 Pandemic phase, all the class tests, internal and external examinations and even practical examinations were conducted in online mode and special care has been taken for the conceptual clarification of the students. Even parent teachers meetings were conducted in online mode for the holistic betterment of the students in their studies.

The Grievance Redressal System Is Time- Bound and Efficient Response:

In Kidderpore College students can register their grievances to the college authorities through different processes in relation to their internal assessments, marks allotment and end semester examinations. All the grievances are addressed and resolved with special care. Students can express their grievances through various modes, like -

Students can approach to their concerned teachers or head of the departments.

Students can directly talk to the convenors of the exam committee, academic committee etc.

Students can directly submit their grievance letters to the principal's office which are later on solved by the office personals and teachers

All these issues there after resolved by proper actions taken by the Principal and related sub-committees.

The students can apply for RTI/PPR/ Review for the discrepancies in their end-semester results as per the University norms through the college office.

Mentor Mentee groups act efficiently in dealing with the individual student-based grievances and resolve these matters very competently.

1. The University designs the curriculum and the affiliated colleges adhere to it. Our college strives to ensure that the students receive the curriculum in a systematic and effective way. Although the learning outcome statement is not well-defined by the University, every department of Kidderpore College takes care to identify the learning outcomes from the courses.

2.The College uses different methods to communicate about the programme and course outcomes as offered by the institution. The college prepares an Academic Calendar at the start of the session, which is accessible on the college website and the Prospectus. The programme outcomes and course outcomes are displayed on the college website.

3.Faculty members of all the departments work on the Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes as per the syllabi of the university. This syllabi of all the courses are reflected in the college website and the students are also informed about it in the classrooms.

4. The outline of the program outcomes is mentioned in the Orientation Programme for the newly admitted students on the day of commencement of an academic session. \cdot The details of the outcomes that are expected from each course are explained in the departmental Orientation programmes.

5. Each department convenes a meeting before the beginning of each session/semester to allocate the topics among the department teachers. Based on the topic allocation, the Academic Plan is prepared to

provide both the teachers and students with a clear timeline for completing the syllabus on time.

6.The IQAC and the Academic Sub-committee reviews the programme outcomes after each semester.

7. The institution keeps a record of the syllabil distribution and the completion of the same. 8. From the programmes offered by the college under the guidelines of the University the students develop an aptitude of individual planning, habit of working in groups and even the skill of solving problems.

8. The college teachers participate in University workshops and other workshops conducted by various colleges on the newly introduced CBCS curriculum to stay updated with the University guidelines.

The Program Outcomes (POs)/ Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are accomplished through curriculum. Course Outcomes (COs) are defined for each course and they are related to POs / PSOs. A set of performance evaluation criteria is used for quantitative assessment of COs & POs.

Attainment of COs

In adherence to the stipulations of the University of Calcutta, apart from the end-semester examinations, Kidderpore College conducts an internal examination consisting of attendance (10%), internal assessment (IA) (10%), and tutorial examination (15% for non-practical based subjects)/Practical examination (30% for practical based subjects).

The overall CO attainment is calculated by considering 65% (Courses with Tutorial Assessment) or 50% (Practical based courses) or 80% of the level of attainment from university examination and 50% (Practical based course) or 35% (Courses with Tutorial Assessment) or 20% of the level of attainment from Continuous assessment.

Overall CO attainment (Courses with tutorial assessment) = 20% of Internal Assessment Attainment + 15% of Tutorial Assessment Attainment + 65% of University Examination Attainment

Overall CO attainment (Courses with practical assessment) = 20% of Internal Assessment Attainment + 30% of Practical Assessment Attainment + 50% of University Examination Attainment

Overall CO attainment = 20% of Internal Assessment Attainment + 80% of University Examination Attainment

Response:

The overall ambience and general campus facilities in the College are sufficient to meet the needs of students and staff. Within 18Kt & 11 Ch campus area, our college has its own building having five floors. The college has 24 spacious, well-lit, clean and ventilated classrooms. College laboratories use high-quality advanced equipment and fixtures. Male and female students' restrooms are located on the ground floor. One disabled friendly restroom is also there. Teachers have separate washrooms. The College assures the maintenance of hygiene in the campus and all the washrooms are cleaned at regular intervals.

Classrooms, practical laboratories and computer labs are present for the enhancement of students' learning activities. Teaching-learning is improved by using Smart-classrooms. Few classrooms have LCD facilities and the campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Practical-based subjects like Journalism and Geography are taught in separate classrooms with high-quality advanced equipment and features. In our college, Room No. 9 is used as the Seminar Hall for conducting workshops, seminars, conferences and special lectures by eminent academicians, industry experts from all over the globe. All the cultural activities are also organised in Room no 9. This classroom is IT enabled with dedicated set of projector facilities, audio system, and unrestricted Wi-Fi access. There are eight ICT enabled classrooms (having LCD projectors).

A Language Lab is present for enhancing language capacity of students. A room is allotted in the name of HEPSN(Higher Education for People with Special Needs). An IQAC room is used for doing all kinds of internal quality assurance work as well as taking classes.

The College gives immense importance to extra-curricular activities. The students excel in multifarious co-curricular activities and perform in various inter-college and intra-college competitions. A playground adjacent to the college building(playground of Kidderpore Academy School) is used for sports practises, outdoor games and specially NCC activities. The college sports is organized annually in Calcutta University Playground, Maidan. The common room has some indoor games facilities like the Carrom board. Gymnasium is also maintained for physical fitness. College rooftop is also used for conducting yoga and NSS activities. The college has a well equipped Gymnasium for the students. Both girls and boys can do their exercises in the Gym at different time slot.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

Library is partially automated with Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) of version: 3 using the ILMS software: e-Granthalaya. The library has computerized catalogue OPAC for online catalogue search. The College is greatly indebted to the National Informatics Centre, the technological partner of

Govt. of India for providing the software and technology supports absolutely free of cost. Initially, the software was installed in a single computer in 2014. In 2016, it started operating in client-server architecture, forming a LAN of 6 computers in the library. Library is wi-fi enabled and approximately fifty students can sit and read at a time in the library reading room. Every year a bulk number of updated and new syllabus-oriented text books and reference books are purchased for students' and teachers' benefit. A repository of around 29,000 text and reference books are available in the library. At present, approx.13500 books have been bar-coded and catalogued using the Cataloguing module of e-Granthalaya. Library subscribes four leading daily newspapers in physical form in four different languages (Pratidin in Bengali, Times of India in English, Akhbar-E-Mashriq in Urdu and Sanmarg in Hindi) and a newspaper reading desk is provided in reading room where students as well as teachers can read. The library has two separate desktops with internet facility for use of students. There is Library Membership Form is given in the library section for the students to get direct access of the membership card. Separate Registers are maintained for students and teachers in the library area. Borrowing facility is given by the library in regular mode for students in which they can borrow maximum two books at a stretch for 7 days and after that time period renewal facility is also given. The entire library premise is under CCTV surveillance and has two fire extinguishers for safety. Computers, Study area and CCTV system and other machines in the library are maintained by centralized agencies. The Librarian organizes Library Orientation Programme (online / physical) at the beginning of the academic sessions to make students aware of all the services and facilities provided by the library.

At present we have total 80 computers out of which 30 computers are used in computers laboratories and 6 are used in the language lab. 4 Computers are used by college office, 5 computers are used in the library among which 2 computers are used by the students, 8 computers are used in the Journalism and Mass Communication Lab .All the departments have their own laptops. Regarding hardware upgradation, RAMs and SSDs are installed regularly to make the systems faster. Few old

systems have been replaced with newly procured systems. Old obsolete machines have been taken care through proper e-waste management. To run the cloud-based systems, the Desktops and Laptops are connected with high bandwidth internet connection through Ethernet as well as Wi-Fi. The college has Five (5) root routers which are placed in the Principal's office, Library, Journalism Lab, Staff room, IQAC room and Computer Lab along with four wireless range extenders to cover up the extended areas of the campus. Each router has a speed of 100 Mbps. New internet connections and bandwidth upgradation are done on regular basis to meet the increasing access demand. The college has good coverage of Wi-Fi with high-speed internet connection to allow the students to access the internet. College Administrative Office is furnished with high configured four (4) computers, along with two (2) HP Laser Jet Printers and one (1) scanner. Office is also well connected with internet and high-speed internet connection suitable for completion of office work properly. Computer lab is well furnished with high configured computers (30) and one (1) printer with high-speed Wi-fi facilities for making students digitally empowered. These computers are regularly updated and well maintained. The institution uses Windows 10, windows XP, Windows 7, MS office 2007 and MS office 2010 etc. The College Website contains information on all courses, fee structure, faculty details, admission procedures, infrastructure, research activities, forthcoming events, university related information etc. INFOTECH maintains and updates College websites on a regular basis. The notice section is dynamically database-driven, because of which the college admin panel can also control it. Having an SSL certificate installed on our website, allows for secured encrypted connections. A new website is also developed with more upgradation.

• Since 1966 Kidderpore College as an Arts & Commerce College under the University of Calcutta plays a vital role in the expansion of higher education. The vision of the college is to make the students self-reliant and inculcate a love of knowledge as well as co-curricular activities and provide holistic and inclusive education to the students coming from every stratum of society so that they can establish themselves as ideal responsible citizens. It is also the vision of the College to guide the students in the field of social responsibility.

Mission

- Our mission is to move towards excellence in higher education. In order to achieve this the college coordinates the activities of the teachers, students and other staff members to ensure smooth functioning and all-round development of academic as well as other curricular activities. The mission of the college is also to ensure gender equality and make them self-reliant in the household, society and workplace. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college, in consultation with the Principal, works to ensure standard and quality education.
- Different sub-committees under the convenorship of a teacher(s) assist the Principal to work for overall management of the various operations of the college, such as, admission, academic matters, conduct of examinations, promotion of research and extension activities, development of infrastructure-facilities, appointment of staff, leave and maintenance of service records, etc. The management mobilizes funds for upgradation of infrastructure, laboratory, library and office, along with creating environment friendly campus/premise.

The aim of the institution is to impart holistic education by implementing NEP along with the existing curriculum from 2023-24. To substantiate is the mentor- mentee practice which has continuously played a significant role in solving many a problems of the students. The institution organised seminars on NEP-2020 and also took initiative to participate the faculties in the other institution and Universities for the same.

The college practices a democratic and participatory method of governance with all stakeholders participating actively in its administration in accordance with the vision and mission statement of the college.

The Governing Body is the highest decision making body for college administration who delegates authority to the Principal. It is comprised of teaching and non-teaching members, University and Government nominees and student representative.

Several Statutory Committees are constituted by Governing Body for efficient management of governance. Teachers' Council and its members are also authorized with the clearly outlined responsibility.

The Heads of Departments, the Convenors of various Sub-committees along with the staff representatives work proactively in determining the institutional policies and implementing thesame. The Governing Body members of the college meet at least 4 times per year.

Teacher's Council meetings are held regularly and open discussions are held in the meetings on various agenda with the Principal as chair.

The IQAC plays a pivotal role for quality assurance and encourages all the stakeholders to enhance their performance through various mechanisms. Feedback isobtained from teachers, students and alumni and analysed.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The college follows the rules and regulations decided by the University of Calcutta to which it is affiliated. At the same time being a grant-in-aid HEI, the institution is to follow the rules of the State Government and the UGC.

The Governing Body is the apex body of governance in the college. The Governing Body consists of the President, the Principal (ex-officio Secretary), Government nominees, University nominees, and nominee from Higher Education Council, teachers' representatives, non-teaching staff representative and

students' representative. The Principal is responsible for all the academic and administrative activities of the college.

The Principal is assisted by IQAC, the office staff, the academic sub-committee, teachers' council, finance sub-committee, and various other committees with the approval of the Governing Body. Financial decisions are taken by the Finance Committee comprised of the Governing Body's internal and external members and is finally approved by the Governing Body. IQAC meetings regularly take place. External members are invited to give their inputs.

The Teachers' Council ensures smooth flow of communication between the administration and the teaching staff. The Principal acts as the Chairperson of the Teachers' Council. The Head Clerk assists the Principal in assigning duties to non-teaching staff and in monitoring their execution. Under the direction of the Principal, the academic committee, Teachers' Council, extension activity cell, admission committee, and examination committee regulate the policies. The different administrative and academic arms of the college, like the committees, departments, work in tandem to achieve goals of the perspective plan and ensure a decentralized administrative process. The proposals arising from the feedback system (student, faculty, alumni, parents) and various bodieslike the IQAC, Teachers' Council, the sub-committees are considered for execution in the Governing Body and the Finance Committee, where required.

The appointments of the teaching staff are done following government rules and regulations. The West Bengal College Service Commission (WBCSC) conducts a centralized selection process for appointing teachers to government aided colleges. The body, then, sends letters of recommendation to the college against vacant posts requisitioned by the college. The Governing Body, on receiving the appointment letters, adopts a resolution to issue an appointment letter to the candidate, who is required to join within a stipulated period as set out by WBCSC. In case, the candidate declines to join the post, requisition is again sent to WBCSC for recommending a candidate according to their centralized merit panel. The appointment of the non –teaching staff, in case of vacancies, is done in accordance with the state government orders and memos, as issued from time to time, however some part time staffs , approved by the governing body are appointed . Service rules of all staff against substantive posts are in accordance with the existing government rules, regulations and in compliance with the statutes of the University of Calcutta, to which the college is affiliated.

- Performance BasedAppraisal System (PBAS) for teaching staff is followed as mandated by the State Directorate of Higher Educationand adheres strictly to norms laid down by UGC under API scheme of promotion.
- The IQAC ensures fairness of Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) papers reflecting internal performance level and fidelity of informative personal data in career advancement.
- Departmental meetings with the Principal are held.
- Principal has discussed regularly with IQAC Coordinator, TCS and Service Book & Leave Sub-

committee on case-to-case basis.

- The Principal discusses with the Head Clerk and non-teaching GB representative on all matters relating to non-teaching staff.
- The Grievance Redressal Cell of the college acts for the teaching & non-teaching members as well as students.
- For non-teaching staff existing State Government rules regarding promotion are followed. The NTS against substantive post enjoy career advancement through promotional benefit of scale enhancements at the end of ten years and twenty years of service, as per current rules and regulations.

Welfare Measures and Avenues for Career Development/Progression

- Being a government-aided institution, all employees in substantive posts enjoy the privilege of both government medical insurance/health scheme (WBHS) &SwasthyaSathiprogramme, state aided college teachers (SACT) will avail only SwasthyaSathiprogramme.
- Special Quarantine Leave was made available in case either the employee or his/her family members were affected by COVID 19.
- Substantive post can avail Medical Leave per year 20 days full pay.
- Loan facility from Provident Fund (refundable or non-refundable) is provided to the employees in substantive posts according to government regulations.
- Casual leave of 14 days is provided for the employees.
- SACT can avail medical leave of 20 days with half remuneration per year.
- Duty leave for faculty to attend seminars, conferences, FDP, RC, OP, and any other courses which are required for the career development of incumbent and quality enhancement of the institution.
- Female employees, both substantive and SACT, are entitled to Maternity Leave 180 days).
- Male employees can avail Paternity Leave (15 days).
- Female employees are entitled to Child Care Leave (2 years).
- Study leave is granted to all teachers for research-related activities.
- Governing Body may also approve Extra-Ordinary Leave on special grounds.
- Puja Holidays to both teaching and non-teaching staff. The order is issued by the Higher Education Department, which is strictly followed by the college.
- Leave encashment benefit is available for staff in substantive posts as per Govt. rules.
- Provision for providing festival advance to non-teaching staff.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Our college is a government sponsored college. The institution executes a transparent strategy for mobilization and utilization of funds. The salary of teachers and non-teaching staff comes from the government HRMS. The main source of income of college is fees received from students. Such fess structures are revised when required. Another source of income is interest received on long-term fixed deposits. Some major expenditure heads are Part-time Salary, Software Development, Building Repair & Maintenance, and Computer Repair & Maintenance. The excess of income over expenditure is kept as accumulated fund. Types and methods of resource mobilization and utilization are discussed in the meetings of Finance Committee, Building Development Committee and are approved by the Governing Body of the college. The institution seeks to mobilize grants from government authorities such as UGC, the State Government ,seminar grant from ICSSR or other recognized body like West Bengal Urdu Academy; Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal; NSS, NCC, etc. The Building subcommittee decided for further construction of the annex building for meeting up the space requirement and the construction work has been started during this period.

The college has a separate mechanism to ensure financial discipline. Each payment voucher is signed by the account's office, the Principal and the Bursar. Bursar is the internal financial administrator of the college appointed by the Governing Body. His job is related to day-to-day financial affairs and helps the Principal in the maintenance of the accounts. The work done by the accountant is again verified by him and the Principal for authenticity, accuracy and transparency. An external audit is done annually after

the completion of the financial year. The college appoints the external auditor as per the recommendation of the Directorate of Public Instructions (DPI), Government of West Bengal. The external auditor examines:

- 1. Purchase Register and Stock register.
- 2. Library records and Accession Register.
- 3. Receipts and Payments Account, Income and Expenditure Account, and Balance Sheet.
- 4. Utilization of funds received from various agencies.

The auditor (Audit Firm) so appointed prepares a report on the basis of its observations. The external auditor, recommended by the Higher Education Directorate, Government of West Bengal, checks whether the expenditure is allowed under a particular head and its limit. Queries raised by the auditor are duly clarified, and no queries remain pending till date. Finally, the audited financial reports are tabled in the Governing Body for approval and ratification. The audit report is mandatorily sent to the office of the Director of Public Instructions, Government of West Bengal, immediately after the execution of the audit.

Response:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has immensely contributed in overall quality enhancement of the institution. Various quality assurance strategies and processes initiatives have been taken by the IQAC of the institution are as under:

During the pandemic period technology has supported to carry on the college activities smoothly in online mode. Teaching-learning, conducting several webinars, celebration of special events, etc., can only be possible in virtual mode with maximum students' participation. Technological advancement creates a visible impact on academic development. The IQAC has tried to utilise Information and Communication Technology (ICT) optimally. Several webinars, seminars, students' seminar, celebration

of Independence Day, International Yoga Day and International Mother Language Day, Students Credit Card awareness programmes, cultural programmes like RabindraSmaran and BasantUtsav with students, students' participation in inter-college fest, etc., are regularly held under the supervision of IQAC of the institution.

Teaching-learning process is regularly monitored by the IQAC. The introduction of new course structure under NEP (2020) in the session 2023-24 along with existing CBCS courses has been smoothly implemented in all the departments of the college. All the faculty members are encouraged and supported to participate in Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, FDPs, Workshops, Seminars and Conferences related to the teaching-learning process and research. This is done with the intention of renewing skills of the teaching faculty to enhance quality in teaching process. Our non-teaching staff are also encouraged to participate in administrative training programmes for the smooth and efficient running of the office and administration. Teachers are also encouraged to attend workshops relating to NEP and the feedback is given to all the faculty members. There have been talks in the College by experts in the field of NAAC assessment which have helped in streamlining the preparation of AQARs and the SSR.

Collaborative quality initiatives with other institutions have taken by the IQAC by signing Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with them.

Several skill enhancement ability courses along with Add-on/Certificate Courses have been introduced by several departments to disseminate the skill-based knowledge to the students required in future job opportunities.

The appraisal of Teaching Faculty is done for Career AdvancementScheme (CAS). The appraisal of Non-teaching Staff has been donedirectly and promoted on the basis of seniority and time scale.

Regular meetings of IQAC are conducted under the chairmanship of the Principal with the fixed agenda and suggestions are taken from all the members of IQAC for improvement.

Besides, IQAC has recorded other following annual incremental improvement in teaching learning process, structures& methodologies of operations and learning outcomes of the institution:

- The Academic Audit and Administrative Audithave conducted by IQAC. These are conducted by external experts is another fruitful mechanism to review the SWOC analysis of the teaching-learning system and thorough evaluation of the administrative work respectively.
- The IQAC collects online feedback from stakeholders like students, parents, and alumni to facilitate teaching-learning reforms.

Several students' enrichment programmes have been conducted in virtual mode during prolonged lockdown for mental relief of the students.

Response:

The years between 2018-2023 marked another significant phase in the history of Kidderpore College and the empowerment of women. Besides adopting familiar measures like separate toilets for men and women,CCTV devices and vending machines for sanitary napkins it expanded the horizon of the equality of the sexes by the inclusion of several initiatives. It was a critical phase due to the colossal humanitarian crisis created by the covid pandemic coupled with the inherent features of a patriarchal society in a developing and multicultural nation.

Infrastructure

Kidderpore College has established the following for gender equity- (a) Internal Complaints Committee (b) Grievance and Redressal Cell (c) Anti ragging Cell and (d) Women's Cell. The male-female faculty ratio is 1:2.

Initiatives of the college

Gender Audit: Gender equality may be defined as the equality of all men and women and equal enjoyment of rights and opportunities without discrimination. However, it also provides for circumstances where they may not be treated exactly alike. The purpose of gender audit is to promote gender equality within the college, and provide a meaningful platform for collective discussion, analysis and construction of a participatory process. It also identifies spaces of gender imbalance in the institution; promotes gender balance in decision making bodies and monitors efforts for prevention of sexual harassment in the college.

Gender sensitization programmes

In the years 2018-2019, the college organized three gender awareness programmes in collaboration with the NGO Swayam. The first programme in 2018 emphasized the importance of raising awareness among the students on communal harmony and protection of girl's rights during communal riots. The last programme in December 2019 organised a poster competition and games based on gender equality.

During the covid induced lockdown period, beginning in March 2020 the college organised a webinar on women's empowerment and the present generation. This webinar showcased the problems faced by the women of Bangladesh. In 2021 a programme titled "Diversity Matters" was conducted by the initiative of SWAYAM."Women Empowerment in the Light of 21st century Globalisation" was the theme of the

gender sensitization programme in the post covid period in 2022. It showed how the impact of empowerment changed in the era of globalisation. The end of 2022 also witnessed two Awareness programmes by ICC and the Women's Forum respectively. It explained the guidelines of the Prevention and Prohibition of Sexual Harassment Against Women, and theprocedure of lodging complaints and redressal of complaints through this Cell. The second awareness programme focussed on communal harmony and women's rights. Gender sensitization programmes during the covid period showed the strong commitment of Kidderpore College to gender equality in a difficult time.

In March 2023 the emphasis of the gender sensitization programme was on cyber crimes against men and women. The theme of the programme was 'Digit All: Innovation and Technology for Gender Equality'. The second programme held in October was a workshop for freshers by the anti-ragging cell. It focussed on the psychology of students who resort to ragging. A memorandum of understanding was signed with Harimohan Ghosh College in 2023 for women's empowerment.

The Challenge: In the context of Kidderpore College, students hailing primarily from low-income groups with strong socio-religious stereotypes is a challenge to gender equity.
